Task 3 – The Story of the Highland Bagpipes

Read the following text and the seven headings (A-G). Choose the heading which best fits each paragraph. There are two extra headings that do not fit any of the paragraphs.

(0) **G** The bagpipes are one of the most ancient instruments. Contrary to popular belief, the bagpipes were not first heard in Scotland, although they are a Scottish brand. No one knows for certain where the history of the bagpipes began. It is thought that the first sort of bagpipes, which had a single pipe and a chanter with finger holes, came from Ancient Egypt. The earliest legends of the bagpipes being used in Europe came from the Greeks and the Romans.

(1) ___ It is inconclusive when the bagpipes were first used on Scottish shores. They were played in peace and war, to celebrate events and urge the clans towards victory, but not in the form we know them today. A single drone was probably used at first, and a second drone was added around 1500. The third drone appeared only at the beginning of the 18th century, giving us the bagpipes as we know them today. Traditionally, they were made from full animal hide. Today, they are usually made from synthetic fabric.

(2) ___ The bagpipes were used in some great battles in Scottish history. There is a story of them being played at the Battle of Bannockburn where the Scottish King Robert the Bruce defeated King Edward II of England. The playing of the bagpipes was banned in Scotland after 1745 by the government loyal to King George II of England. After the ban was lifted in 1785, the bagpipes began to resurface. They became very popular with Scottish soldiers who carried the instrument to every part of the world, making its sound world famous.

(3) ___ Ever since the bagpipes first arrived at the Scottish shores, they gradually started gaining a foothold in this mountainous region. Eventually, all the chiefs of the Highland clans employed pipers. They were considered a very important part of their households. The Highlanders were the ones to develop the bagpipes into the instrument it is now, and make it a renowned Scottish national brand. Wherever you travel in the world, where there are Scots, you can be sure to hear the sound of the Highland Bagpipes. It is one of the most recognizable symbols of the nation's honoured tradition.

(4) ___ Bagpipes today exist in many forms throughout the world. Most people only know of the Highland Bagpipes, as they are the most common and well-known bagpipes in the world. The basic idea of the bagpipes is the same; the only thing that varies is the number of drones and sounds. It is important to note that there are many variations in countries such as Ireland, France, and Croatia. Since 2015, bagpipe culture has been on the UNESCO List of Intangible Cultural Heritage of Humanity, which is a great boost for its future.

David Bowie was one of the most intriguing musicians of our time, (0) **reinventing** (**invention**) himself continually and influencing countless others along the way.

Bowie's flamboyant persona, innovativeness, sexual ambiguity, and magnificent music kept the public (1) _____ (**end**) interested and entertained. And his music definitely was magnificent. Even though his melodies were quite simple, there was this (2) _____ (**insidious**) about them and the way they seeped into one's ear and remained there. Perhaps it was precisely that haunting aspect of his music that proved crucial in ensuring success that would result in a proliferation of studio albums (more than two dozen) during a career that spanned decades.

For starters, though his eyes were seemingly of different colours, he actually suffered from *anisocoria*, a condition where the pupil of one eye is permanently dilated, thus giving it the appearance of different coloration. Speaking of teen years, another interesting fact is that young David founded the *Society for the Prevention of Cruelty to Long-Haired Men* at the tender age of seventeen. Talk about ambition and social awareness.

And ambitious he was! Apart from a successful career in music, he will also go on to achieve a remarkable career in the cinematic world, starring in a number of films, but also voicing the character of Lord Royal Highness, the emperor of Atlantis in *SpongeBob SquarePants*. Some go as far as to claim that he contributed (5) _____ (**equity**) to both fields, though others would always give (6) _____ (**precede**) to his music over his films.

Taking everything into account, it comes as no surprise that someone as grand as Bowie continued surprising us even after his passing. Only a few months after his death, a lock of his hair – cut off by an employee of the Madam Tussaud's Museum in London – was sold at an auction for almost 19,000 dollars. A far cry for a man who once, in his heyday, living (7) _____ (**connection**) from the real world and troubled by emotional issues and substance abuse, feared that a wizard might steal his urine.

Another post-mortem validation of his greatness came from an altogether unexpected source, when the powerhouse Mattel, marking the 50th anniversary of his first major hit *Space Oddity*, launched an androgynous Barbie doll with flaming red hair, a gold sphere on its forehead, black varnished nails, and a psychedelic space suit.

Love him or hate him, one cannot deny that Bowie was a colourful, one-of-a-kind character who partook in life and his art (8) _____ (**condition**) and with abandon.

Nowadays, there is a growing number of places around the world looking to reduce their reliance (0) **on** cars. What lessons can be learned from a Greek island that never allowed them in the first (1) _____? Welcome to Hydra, the island of donkeys.

Hydra's archaic reliance on donkeys for transport stems from a 1950s presidential decree that was intended (2) _____ preserve the Greek island's architecture and tradition. It includes a rule that wheeled vehicles cannot be used there. Since the town is built on steep hills, donkeys are the only form of transport that can climb the steep steps and stone streets.

Towards the end of a holiday through the Greek islands, I was intrigued to see a place that (3) _____ never permitted cars. It was remarkably quiet; none of the screeching brakes or roaring engines typical of places elsewhere. Occasionally, I heard a donkey honking or church bells clattering, but otherwise, silence reigned.

On my first morning in Hydra, I woke up early and ambled down to the waterside dock to watch the weekly deliveries (4) _____ carried out fast. Patiently queuing to board the boat were several donkeys. The donkey drivers – all moustachioed island men – quickly led their charges away up alleys.

Our guide explained that since much of the island is inaccessible (5) _____ to its lack of roads, the local firefighting volunteer groups are unable to put out fires on their own. Everyone has to run and manually carry the water up. And fires aren't the only time when a lack of vehicles is a hindrance. The guide added that getting to the town's small medical centre can be very difficult when people have health emergencies. Often, people need to be brought down on a stretcher or on the back of a donkey to get seen by medics, which can feel rather undignifying. And what locals need, first and (6) _____, is reliable medical care.

Besides emergencies, there are a lot of other daily inconveniences that come with living in a place where vehicles aren't allowed. Finally, our guide pointed (7) _____ that getting things delivered is a pain, and the costs of transporting building materials are astronomical. Still, she reckons that most Hydriots (8) _____ rather keep the status quo if they were pushed to make a choice.
